




Christopher Slater and Mike Solomon welcomed shoppers with T-shirts and calendars for sale—and free donuts!

## Where We've Been Ironstone Concours d'Elegance

The best in show winning 1931 840 Deluxe 8 Waterhouse Convertible Victoria owned by Rob Hilarides of Visalia looked stunning in the amphitheater at Ironstone Winery.

Chris Bock continued his tradition of excellence in another beautiful concours d'elegance at Ironstone Winery in Murphys. A benefit for local 4-H and FFA organizations, the event packs the venue with spectators eager to see high quality unmodified vehicles built from the late 1800s to the early 1970s. The display of more than 300 cars was nicely rounded out by 10 Packards, 5 of which belonged to Nor Cal members. The weather was warm, but the club's pop-up tent served as a great spot for folks to gather in the shade and lunch was served in the music room (aptly named because of its massive pipe organ!) which provided another cool spot to rest. Appropriately, but also perhaps in honor of our company's 125th anniversary, an impressive 1931 840 Waterhouse Victoria took Best in Show.

If you've never made the trek to the Gold Country for this grand, but very casual show, mark your calendar for September 27 next year. The Packard class always is placed in a premium spot in the amphitheater for optimum visibility and awards show viewing!

## Where We've Been Niello Concours

Jeanne and I joined old friends and new at the 2024 Niello Concours at Serrano, held on Sunday, Oct. 6.

This concours at Serrano is held at Village Green Park. It features spectacular grounds with an amphitheater, a central shaded oasis, and a grassy slope overlooking a bandstand and lake. A clear, bright sky and mild morning temperatures grew to be hot by midafternoon, not at all unusual for this time of year in El Dorado County.

The grounds are used to artfully display an eclectic array of beautiful vehicles, grouped in about 30 different classes. With the bright and varied colors of the cars, I was reminded of paint on an artist's palette. New and old, exotics and supercars, American and European and Asian... There must have been a car exhibited this day that would appeal to almost anyone's tastes.

All the Packard classes were clustered on the best spot on the field, a beautiful slope overlooking the lake that provides wonderful backgrounds for photos. But the thing I most like is that the background is delightfully animated. Like squadrons of military aircraft, flocks of birds arrive during the day, performing artful aerial maneuvers and graceful water landings.

The event organizers were celebrating 20 years for this event, a remarkable achievement without a doubt. I understand that it is an all-hands-on-deck effort by the Moore Family [unrelated to your editor/regional director]. Likely there are more than one tall poles supporting this tent, but I know that Michelle and Brian Moore have special responsibility for the success of this extravaganza. The program booklet was a great read. I counted maybe five thoughtful and well produced articles on Packard. It is a slick publication.

Why do you own an old Packard? Many of us can point to a specific event when our grandfather/uncle/neighbor/stranger somehow involved us with an old car. Hoping to help seed that interest in others, Jeanne and I look for ways to engage others, especially the young. We freely hand out business cards with a photo of the car on front, specs on the back. At this concours, we invited anyone who was interested to get into the rumble seat on our car.

Many enthusiastically, some more reluctantly agreed to make the challenging three-step climb into a feature that has all but vanished in modern times. One couple sent me a text and photo of them in the seat saying it was the highlight of their day. I believe we should all be finding ways to invite the public to our spectacular vehicles.

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
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
